March Madness Author Study Project <u>Project #1: All About the Author - Informational</u>

In this project, you will research **everything** you can about your author, learning specifically **why** your author actually became a writer!

- First, using your research graphic organizer and the research resources provided to you in the March Madness Google Classroom, research and take notes on your author. You may research your author the following ways: checking out a book from the media center, MackinVia, and your author's official website.
- Next, be sure to read and take notes in a sequential order about your author's life.
 Remember to only take notes on the most important details about your author, and find out why they became a writer!
- Then, using your notes you will write an informational piece about your author that will TEACH the class about WHY your author wanted to become a writer. You can write this piece from two different perspectives, either from the perspective of the author (using 'I') or from the perspective of your author's most famous character (using 'he' or 'she').
- When you complete your writing piece, you will create a poster to look like your author or your author's most famous character (whichever perspective you chose to write your piece from).
- You will cut out a hole in the poster board for you to put your own head through in order to present your author (therefore, either becoming the author, or becoming one of their most famous characters)!
